Capacity Building for the National Trust Ideal Half year highlights report April - September 2020

Supporting our members through a year of turbulence The impact of the pandemic for National Trusts around the world has been huge. We took the early decision to support strugging trusts by providing urgent grants responding to the crisis.

From Indonesia and Jordan to Saint Lucia and Slovakia, these grants provided a critical lifeline to struggling heritage trusts to invest in the things that can keep them open during a pandemic. Grants paid for laptops, hand gel, masks and barriers, and the reporting has underlined the importance of this to the recipients.



The Indonesian Heritage Trust used their grant to produce masks from traditional fabrics, equipping their conservation team with the protection they needed to continue working.

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As part of our commitment to sharing best practice in the international heritage space, our Deputy Secretary-General has delivered a series of webinars that support the sector at this challenging time.

We have focused on practical themes that can contribute directly to the operation of our members, as well as promoting the expertise already within the network. Fifteen INTO members have presented as part of one of these sessions and more than 500 people have attended. In order to maximise our reach, some have been delivered in with external partners, most recently including the V&A museum.



Fostering growth in the National Trust family

INTO has worked with members to unlock more than £350K in funds for projects that deliver our organisational goals over the next two years.

In Uganda, we're working with our African network to preserve intangible cultural heritage threatened by climate change, creating opportunities for mentorship between the UK and East Africa.



In partnership with the Petra National Trust, we are delivering training on how to maximise the potential of heritage as a community resource, supporting a series of innovative projects in countries across the Middle East.

Six National Trusts from across Europe are planning to take part in a series of training placements relating to the theme of widening access to heritage sites, learning from their neighbours and sharing skills around the continent.

In Georgia, we will be supporting the National Trust to develop a working holidays programme while restoring a tower destroyed by Russian jets in the 1990s. National Trust Georgia staff will complete secondments with INTO members in France and the UK.

Growing the National Trust movement

In 2020 we committed to growing our reach by inviting heritage NGOs to learn about the National Trust model.

The result was the INTO incubator, and after a postponement from March due to coronavirus, we are happy to announce that the Incubator was delivered online over three days in September. In this programme, we welcomed 18 new organisations to the National Trust family, from Poland and Egypt to Jamaica and Singapore. The first three days of the online programme were a huge success thanks to innovative online teaching tools developed by our team.
